Fundraising Ideas A to Z

It costs an average of £135 to rescue one dog, and this just covers the basics: neutering, vaccination, micro-chipping, lead, collar, muzzle and tag; it does not include other costs such as boarding. This means that GRW makes a 'loss' on every dog we home.

Last Hope was a greyhound found left for dead, badly injured and with both ears cut off on a mountainside in the Rhymney Valley. He was discovered lying on rubbish with a hole in his forehead on 2nd May 2004 by a walker, and was later humanely destroyed. But out of such cruelty can come some good.

Greyhound Rescue Wales set up a '**Last Hope Fund**' and holds an annual sponsored walk to raise money for this. This money has been used to rescue, treat and rehome especially desperate greyhounds or lurchers for whom the only other option would have been euthanasia.

SASHA'S STORY

Sasha is a tri-paw lurcher who was brought into GRW when three years old. She had lost her leg in a traffic accident which had left her traumatised. She was deeply suspicious of everything. She didn't trust people and wasn't too sure about dogs either. She didn't like to be touched and had a record of having bitten. The only way to get her into the kennels when she arrived was to drive right up and open the boot so she walked straight in. Even getting a lead or collar on her was impossible.

The only way to start with a traumatised and fearful dog is to build trust. This began by slowly teaching Sasha some skills using food rewards and got her out of the

kennels to the calmer environment of an assessment room. It was important early on to learn about her and what the triggers were that made her feel uncomfortable or threatened.

Slowly and gradually, Sasha began learning that life was safe and predictable. She could feel more confident in choosing to make different responses in the way she behaved. As she began to make progress, a willing volunteer buddied with Sasha and recorded her progress regularly.

Soon Sasha had caught the attention of a prospective adopter and a new home for the troubled girl was in prospect. But we knew it was important to take it gently. After an initial meeting, her adopters visited the centre for several 'getting to know you' visits both at the centre and out and about. Once everyone felt confident she was ready for home, there was one last hurdle: to make sure that Sasha was comfortable with car travel again. Six weeks after that first meeting with her adopters, Sasha was on her way to her new home.

She has settled really well. Her new family have an exercise routine that works and use lots of mental enrichment to stimulate and satisfy her zest for life!



In addition to successfully finding adoptive homes for some dogs, we are very proud to offer sanctuary to a small number of dogs for whom the possibility of a home as a companion is more difficult due to their significant health or behaviour issues. For these dogs, we provide ongoing training and rehabilitation, as well as safety, security and important continuity of care. These lives matter to us and we do all we can to take responsibility for them.

Auction

One of our wonderful volunteers organises an annual Last Hope countrywide auction and in order not to induce auction fatigue amongst our Facebook followers we are restricting this to once or twice a year. Birthdays

Charity Ball

Dog show

How about organising a Fun Dog Show? Invite local dog owners to the park or other open space to take pride in their pooches. Prizes could include best in show, waggiest tail, dog that looks most like their owner. If you are using a public space such as a park you will need permission from the council.

Eco day

Dress in green and do good deeds for the day, like litter picking and recycling your rubbish. Remember to get sponsored for all the activities you do.

Fancy Dress Party

Football/netball/cricket/chess/golf/tiddlywinks tournament

Start a league and get friends, family and neighbours to join with proceeds going to Greyhound Rescue Wales.

Garden Party

Even if you have a small garden you could invite friends and neighbours round for a strawberry tea and a glass of fizzy. A small charge would reimburse you and raise money. You could add a cake sale or raffle to the same event.

Give it up!

Get sponsored to go without something. Give up speaking for a day, fast for a day, give up computer games for a week, coffee for a week, chocolate for a fortnight, alcohol for a month, or give up magazines for a whole year! Or you could loose weight for charity. Donate the money you save get people to sponsor you.

And Have Fun!

Boring but necessary:

Keep your fundraising legal –

Fundraising is controlled by law and regulation. You as a fundraiser and Greyhound Rescue Wales can be fined for breaking the rules, so if you're not sure, please do get in touch with us.

If you are organising a houndy event in a public place, make sure the venue is dog friendly and you have permission.

Alcohol – You need a licence if you have alcohol at your event. It's easier to hold your event on licensed premises i.e. in a local pub or by asking a local pub to organise a bar at your venue. Food – If you're selling food or it is available please consider safety laws; to be sure, contact the Food Standard Agency on at www.food.gov.uk

Greyhound Rescue Wales branding – If you're using our logo and charity numbers you must contact us for guidelines and approval.

Stay safe! – It is important to make sure everyone at your event, including spectators, stays safe while having fun. For carrying out a risk assessment and for safety

information see <http://greyhoundrescuewales.co.uk/wp-content/uploads/2013/05/GRW-Risk-Assessment-Form-V2.0.pdf>.

Insurance – Ensure your venue has sufficient insurance to cover your event. If you organise an event that involves the public, you will need to ensure you have adequate public liability insurance.

Entertainment – When two or more people are performing it is best to check with your local council to see if you need a Public Entertainment Licence.

Or, an alternative is to set up a JustGiving page. It's easy for people to sponsor you straightaway by credit or debit card, instead of sponsors saying they will and then forgetting! You don't have to chase anyone up for money. Gift Aid is automatically added, collecting a 25 per cent bonus with no extra cost or effort from you or your sponsor if they are a tax payer. It's secure, with all sponsorship money sent to Greyhound Rescue Wales immediately after being donated on JustGiving. Personalise it with photos and updates about your event and your friends, family and contacts all over the world can add their encouragement as well.

At the end of an event the organiser will need to collect any collecting boxes and buckets. In an ideal situation, the boxes/buckets would be opened with a disassociated person present as this gives some cover against suspicion/allegations of theft. We have to be realistic and accept that this is not always possible.

Once money has been counted and bagged, it needs to be banked. A record must be sent to the Treasurer of the amount raised; how it was raised; who banked it. The treasurer is: andy.jackson@greyhoundrescuewales.co.uk

A letter of thanks needs to be sent to anyone whose premises were used, any businesses supporting or sponsoring. Volunteers must also be thanked.
